Once you have all of these things, your home will be ready to welcome a new member of the family! Then, all you need to do is add some love.



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

Recycle Frog Craft

Materials

- Empty toilet paper rolls
- Acrylic paint, coloured pencils or markers
- Scissors
- Stapler
- Glue
- Pencil & eraser

Instructions:

Step 1 Gather your materials! We used acrylic paint to give our koi fish their beautiful colours.

Step 2 Paint each toilet paper roll in a colour of your choice.

Step 3 Create the fish scales by painting small 'U' shapes.

Step 4 Paint fins and a fish tail for each fish onto thick paper or card (we used acrylic paper). There's no need to be too fussy here - simple shapes will do the trick.

Step 5 Carefully cut out your fish tails. This step might require help from a parent or babysitter!

Step 6 We matched the fish tails to the colours of the fish scales.

Step 7 Squeeze the sides of the toilet paper roll together and staple your fish tail to the toilet paper roll (fish body).

Step 8 Carefully cut out the fish fins.

Step 9 Paint (or colour) long, thin strips of card in a shade of pink (this will be the fish's lips).

Step 10 Glue or staple the fish lips around the toilet paper roll.

Step 11 Add the fish's eye. To create the eye, we simply painted a black dot on a piece of white card and then cut a circle around it.





Superstitions: The Good and the Bad


Are you superstitious? Many people believe that an item or event can cause good or bad things to happen. Superstitions aren't based on facts or science. They don't follow logic. There is no proof that something can bring good luck, or cause bad luck. But that doesn't stop people from being superstitious. Here are some common superstitions.

Superstitions for Good Luck

- Crossing your fingers
- Four-leaf clovers
- Picking up a penny
- Knocking on wood
- Hanging a horseshoe above a door

Superstitions for Bad Luck

- Friday the 13th and the number 13
- Opening an umbrella indoors
- A black cat crossing your path
- Walking under a ladder
- Breaking a mirror



Superstitions exist around the world. In Denmark, they don't throw out broken dishes. They save them until New Year's Eve. Then, they throw them at their friends' houses to bring them good luck. In China, 4 is an unlucky number. The elevators in some buildings don't list a 4th floor. In India, it is said to be bad luck to trim your nails at night. And in Bulgaria, it's actually considered good luck if a bird poops on you!

Where do superstitions come from? Some trace back thousands of years. Take a look at how three superstitions got started.

Breaking a Mirror Brings 7 Years Bad Luck: In ancient Greece, they believed mirrors captured a piece of your soul. When you broke a mirror, your soul got broken, too. They believed it took seven years for a broken soul to heal.

Knocking on Wood: Centuries ago, several cultures believed that spirits and magical creatures lived inside trees. People knocked on trees in hopes that the spirits would help them. Today, we knock on anything made of wood, hoping for good luck.

Opening an Umbrella Indoors: In ancient Egypt, umbrellas weren't for rain. Umbrellas provided shade from the hot sun. The Egyptians worshipped the Sun God, Ra. Opening an umbrella indoors was considered an insult to Ra. People feared offending Ra. If Ra was angry, he might cause bad things to happen.



Consumers are usually birds, mammals, fish, and reptiles

Superstitions: The Good and the Bad

Are you superstitious? Many people believe that an item or event can cause good or bad things to happen. Superstitions aren't based on facts or science. They don't follow logic. There is no proof that something can bring good luck, or cause bad luck. But that doesn't stop people from being superstitious. Here are some common superstitions.

Superstitions for Good Luck

- Crossing your fingers
- Four-leaf clovers
- Picking up a penny
- Knocking on wood
- Hanging a horseshoe above a door

Superstitions for Bad Luck

- Friday the 13th and the number 13
- Opening an umbrella indoors
- A black cat crossing your path
- Walking under a ladder
- Breaking a mirror



Superstitions exist around the world. In Denmark, they don't throw out broken dishes. They save them until New Year's Eve. Then, they throw them at their friends' houses to bring them good luck. In China, 4 is an unlucky number. The elevators in some buildings don't list a 4th floor. In India, it is said to be bad luck to trim your nails at night. And in Bulgaria, it's actually considered good luck if a bird poops on you!

Where do superstitions come from? Some trace back thousands of years. Take a look at how three superstitions got started.

Breaking a Mirror Brings 7 Years Bad Luck: In ancient Greece, they believed mirrors captured a piece of your soul. When you broke a mirror, your soul got broken, too. They believed it took seven years for a broken soul to heal.

Knocking on Wood: Centuries ago, several cultures believed that spirits and magical creatures lived inside trees. People knocked on trees in hopes that the spirits would help them. Today, we knock on anything made of wood, hoping for good luck.

Opening an Umbrella Indoors: In ancient Egypt, umbrellas weren't for rain. Umbrellas provided shade from the hot sun. The Egyptians worshipped the Sun God, Ra. Opening an umbrella indoors was considered an insult to Ra. People feared offending Ra. If Ra was angry, he might cause bad things to happen.




